Chinese Rattle Drum (China)

Sally Heinrich

The rattle drum is one of the oldest and most traditional toys in China, often used in religious ceremonies and adorned with colourful artwork. A small double sided drum attached to a handle that when rolled between the hands, produces a rattling sound. In this workshop you will construct and decorate this traditional Chinese toy.

Fish and Star Weaving (Samoa)

Maryann Talia Pau

Born in Samoa and raised in New Zealand, Maryann will guide you in the traditional Samoan art of weaving. You will create simple yet beautiful designs using ribbon, card and traditional Pandanas leaf. Create a colourful star or fish designs that can be joined together to make a mobile.

African Animal Marionettes (African Continent)

Myf Cadwallader

Using recycled and decorative elements, design and bring to life your own miniature giraffe or rhino, with strings attached! Work alongside artist Myf Caldwaller as she assists you in the creation and the movement of your own African Marionette puppets.

Roman Banner Flags (Italy)

Bridgette Minuzzo

Held high in Roman street parades these festive flags were historically used to identify who you are or to mark your place. Working with visual artist Bridgette Minuzzo you will use a variety of recycled and sourced materials to design and decorate your own personalised flag that you can use to mark and remember your WOMADelaide experience.

Chilean Rain Sticks (Chile)

Justina Legoe

Northern Chile is home to one of the driest deserts on the planet and a place where the rain stick is thought to have originated. A rain stick is a decorative, elongated tube filled with sand or pebbles that when turned creates the sound of a rain storm and believed to evoke the rain spirits. Work with South American inspired artist Justina Legoe to create and decorate your own powerful rain stick.

Dot Painted Boomerangs (Australia)

Nikki Carabetta-Baugh

Dot painting has emerged from the Papunya art movement of the 1970's to become an important part of Australian Aboriginal art. Adelaide based urban aboriginal artist Nikki Carabetta-Baugh will share stories and practices of this fascinating art form before designing and dot painting your own wooden boomerang that tells your own stories.

Mystical Mexican Creatures (Mexico)

Robin Tatlow-Lord

Alebrijes are colourful and fantastical animal folk art sculptures originating from Mexico. Legend says that a native Mexican once had a dream where he saw strange creatures that looked like a combination of different animals. Using foil and discarded materials you will design and paint your own mystical creature. You might like to create a rabbit with wings or a dragon with the head of an angel painted brightly with amazing colours.

Red Packet Lanterns (Malaysia)

Swee Wah Yew

In many Asian cultures a red envelope or red packet is a gift presented at social and family gatherings. Known as *ang pau*, these red coloured envelopes represents good luck and ward off evil spirits. In this workshop you will redesign and recycle these red packets into simple yet beautiful craft works. Be guided by artist Swee Wah Yew to create your own good luck lanterns.
