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

Nusrat Fateh All Khan is revered at home and throughout the islamic world as master of Qawwali singing and the voice of divine power. His legendary status has moved beyond traditional boundaries with 5 hit albums released on the Real World label creating an audience that crosses all boundaries of language, religion and culture. as Womadelaide '92 discovered, Nusrat and his party of musicians and singers deliver an unforgettable musical experience.

SUFI DEVOTIONAL MUSIC OF PAKISTAN

Sufism explores the mystical elements of Islam. Among its ecstatic techniques are dancing, the hypnotic repetition of holy names and music that is literally entrancing. Qawwall is the Sufi music of India and Pakistan.

Essentially it is religious poetry set to music, sharing certain traits with the light classical music of the sub-continent but its sound, with its typically sweeping melodies and rhythmic hand-clapping, is quite distinctive and instantly recognizable. Its intensity has made it extremely popular in Indian films as well as in clubs and other gatherings in India and abroad, but the popular

film qawwali is a far cry from the original - a spiritual song that transports the mystic towards union with the Creator.

The term "qawwali" refers both to the genre itself and its performance. A performer of qawwali is known as a qawwal. A group of qawwals can consist of any number of people, but the minimum requirement is a lead singer, one or two secondary singers (who also play the harmonium) and at least one percussionist. Every member of the group joins in the singing and junior members also clap rhythmically. Under the guidance of a religious leader or shiekh these groups of trained musicians present a vast treasure of poems in song, articulating and evoking a mystical experience for the spiritual benefit of their audience.

"I have no idea how many times I've been asked what I call my music," wrote Gil Scott-Heron for the liner notes of his latest album ("Spirits"). "We have called what we did Midnight Music, Third World Music and Bluesology. Seriously trying to define it I've said Black music, or Black American music. But what do you call reggae, blues, African vibration, jazz, salsa, chants and poetry? In truth I call what I have been granted the opportunity to share gifts."

Gil Scott-Heron was born in Chicago and brought up in Jackson, Tennessee. His mother was a librarian and his father was a professional soccer player. At the age of 17 he moved to New York City where in 1967 he graduated from the Fieldston School of Ethical Culture. He was first published and recorded in 1970. His first novel, "The Vulture", was followed by the equally powerful "The Nigger Factory" and a volume of poetry ("Small Talk at 125th and Lenox"). These works were accompanied by a record of original songs played and sung by Scott-Heron.

Collaborating with musician Brian Jackson, Scott-Heron made some of the most powerfully literate and socially aware albums of the 1970's. Pieces of Man included the poem "The Revolution Will Not be Televised". The 1975 album From South Africa To South Carolina included the hit "Johannesburg". In 1979 he appeared at the anti-nuclear MUSE Benefit where he performed "We Almost Lost Detroit". These early albums laid the groundwork for what was later to become rap music. Scott-Heron worked with Bill Laswell in the 80's ("Re-Ron") and released the single "Space Shuttle" which was followed last year by the album, "Spirits".

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




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Geoffrey Oryema



Oryema grew up surrounded by music: his father played the nanga, a seven-stringed harp; his mother directed the Ugandan dance troupe The Heartbeat of Africa; and his grandfather and uncles were all storytellers and musicians. While still in his teens, Oryema learned to play the nanga, the guitar, the lukeme (thumb piano), and later, the flute; and he started writing songs as well.

At the age of 24, at the height of Idi Amin's powers in Uganda, Oryema had to be smuggled across the border in the boot of a car, following the death of his father, a prominent government minister, in a mysterious 'car accident'. Thus began a life of exile, the

theme of many of his songs ("Makambo", Solitude" and "Exile").

Today his songs keep alive the languages of his youth - Swahili and Acoli - and the folklore he

learned when surrounded by storytellers, poets and singers at home.

On "Exile", his debut album for Real World, Oryema was joined by Peter Gabriel, as well as Brian Eno in the production seat. "Beat The Border", his most recent album, also features French guitarist Jean-Pierre Alarcen who has performed with him for two years and who co-composed six of the tracks. American producer Bob Ezrin (Peter Gabriel, Pink Floyd, Paul Simon) also contributes production and writing.

Zap Mama capture hearts wherever they appear. Their joyous a capella mix of Pygmy music, Central African and Arabic pop tunes, human beatbox sounds, Afro-Cuban rhythms with a touch of soul and gospel, is unique by any standards. Marie Daulne, the leader and main composer of the group, was born in Zaire to a Belgian father and a Zairean mother. She has

realised her wish to explore her roots by travelling across
Central Africa, by studying various vocal and rhythmic traditions, by patiently
collecting songs and dances from her aunts and grandmothers and probably
even looking for inspiration in comics and travel stories. With beautiful five-part
harmonies, their entertaining, humorous and energetic performances are truly
stunning.

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Jak Wobble's Invaders Of The Heart



Jah Wobble began his career as an 18 year-old bass player for John Lydon's Public Image Limited, More than a decade later his own recordings encompass elements of world music, ambient, dance and rock. Since leaving PIL, Wobble has worked with a wide variety of artists - reflecting his own eclectic musical tastes including the renowned Holger Czukav, Peter Gabriel, Bill Laswell's Axiom, Massive Attack, Ginger Baker, Sinead O'Connor, The Edge and more recently with Bjork, Gary Clail, The Orb and Primal Scream. The six-piece Invaders of The Heart borrow their rhythms from five continents but still have a contemporary slant to music that has been described as 'undefinable'

with its often mesmerising qualities. The band took its name from the ancient troupes of dancers and musicians who healed the hearts of weary travellers by 'invading' them. Recommended Listening: Rising Above Bedlam, Take Me To God (1994 Island)

Papa Wemba

From the clubs of Kinshasa, Zaire to the dance floors of Paris. London and New York, lovers of progressive world music agree: Papa Wemba is a true Afro-pop sensation. Papa Wemba (born Shengu Wembiado) has been dubbed "eccentric on a grand scale" by Chris Stapleton and Chris May, authors of "African Rock", His outrageous and colourful lifestyle and antics are the stuff of legend in Kinshasa, where he was once dubbed the "Jeun Premier", and was a youth star. And then there are the Sapeurs, extravagantly dressed young men in Kinshasa, Paris and other fashion centres who have adopted Wemba as the musical godfather of the well dressed and chic. Wemba is comfortable being associated with what is stylish and in vogue, but his musical accomplishments easily tower over any fashion concerns of his followers.

Papa Wemba first hit the spotlight in his native Zaire in 1970 as the vocalist for Zaiko Langa Langa, the sensational young group that pioneered a new, wild and eclectic updating of traditional Zairean soukous, or dance music.

Wemba and the members of Zaiko Langa Langa simultaneously modernised Zairean music by rocking up the standard Zairean rhumba beat, (Wemba called the sound "rhumba rock") and helped to revive interest in older, traditional Zairean instruments and musical forms. The combination of modern and traditional sounds made Wemba the focal point of the most progressive and exciting band working in Kinshasa, the vibrant capital of Zaire that is continually awash in local music.

Papa Wemba left Zaiko Langa Langa in 1974 to follow his own musical visions. First he founded Isife Lokole, followed by Yoka Lokole, but it was with Viva La Musica that he first made his presence felt outside of Zaire, Wemba and Viva La Musica moved to Paris in the late 1980's, where Wemba quickly established himself as a leading exponent of progressive Afro-pop. Wemba eventually decided that he needed a more eclectic group of musicians to help him achieve his increasingly complex and globalist musical aspirations, which had grown to embrace traces of rock, R&B, funk and jazz. Since then he has worked with various combinations of Zairean and European musicians, recorded numerous albums and has frequently played on both continents. "My music is basically dance music, but I don't do things that are simple and straightforward," stated Wemba in World Music: The Rough Guide, "Everything has a traditional source, and I take my themes and rhythms from that, It's a mixture, traditionally based. I try to mix the traditional with my own Recommended Listening: Le Voyageur (Real World)

Sierra Maestra

An outstanding nine-piece son band from Havana, the finest and most popular ensemble performing in the Spanish Caribbean today. Son has become

most important genre of Cuban music, with the basic structure of salsa . They are the only group playing in the old-style line-up - tres, guitar, trumpet, bongo, guiro and vocals of the halcyon '20s and '30s. Now touring the world, their aim is to revive this most popular Cuban music: intoxicating, vigorous, delightful and immensely passionate.

Originally formed in 1976 at the University of Havana, the band became popular through playing annual festivals at the universities around the island. They won the first prize in each of their first three years. Since 1984 Sierra Maestra have toured the world extensively and recorded 7 albums and more than 10 singles.

Leningrad Cowboys

They made a cult movie
"Leningrad Cowboys Go to
America", then made a sequel

and now the lads with unicom hairdos

do WOMADELAIDE. Highly respected
musicians in Finland, the ten cowboys have
made their fortune as "the world's worst rock
'n roll band" in an hilarious parody of a struggling
Russian rockband. To date the Cowboys have

released numerous 'hit' albums, had a beer named after them, appeared at the MTV music awards, and staged two spectaculars with Alexandrov's Red Army Chorus & Dance Ensemble in Helsinki and Berlin. They also drive tractors.

Mouth Music

The first Mouth Music album, released in 1990, caused an immediate stir. Martin Swann - a Scottish TV producer and musician - helped to create a sound that like its name suggested, captured the essence of unaccompanied Scottish dance singing and placed it in a contemporary setting. Swann cites Byrne and Eno's "My Life In The Bush Of Ghosts" as an inspiration for his work. "Amazing" is how he describes the sound of the album which predated 'world music'. On Mouth Music Gaelic vocals were

music'. On Mouth Music Gaelic vocals were mixed with African percussion and dance sounds. The sound of the group has developed considerably over three albums and, apart from Swann (keyboards, fiddle etc), the group is now a six-piece with Jackie Joyce on lead vocals.

Christine Anu



Christine Anu's single Monkey and The Turtle entered the charts as a hit, with her new release "My Island Home" (written by Neil Murray) from her forthcoming album INNA ANU S.T.YL.E. set to follow suit. Her music fuses urban dance grooves, traditional Island stories and samples, dialect and funky guitar riffs over a slap bass sound. Add to this a sweet, soulful and powerful voice and you've got a potent new sound. An AIDT dance graduate and former performer with Bangarra, Christine Anu is an artist on the verge of something very big!

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The Cruel Sea

Nineteen ninety four was a standout year for THE CRUEL SEA, with a double platinum album in Australia ("The Honeymoon Is Over"), an armful of trophies from the ARIA's, and successful Australian and European tours. The band was nominated in 10 categories for the ARIA Awards and ended up with 5 of them,

including the BIG one - Best Australian Band. "The Honeymoon Is Over" was voted
Best Australian Album, with the title track winning Best Australian Single and Australian Song of the
Year. Tony Cohen. producer of "The Honeymoon Is Over" was named Australian Producer of The Year.

After scooping the pool at the ARIA Awards, The Cruel Sea hit Europe for an intense two month tour, stopping off in Toronto, New York and Los Angeles to "showcase" their music on the way home. After a tour of the U.K. a four city Canadian tour followed in November to support A&M Canada's release of "The Honeymoon is Over" album which made inroads into the Canadian market. A&M Records United States signed the band earlier this year. An early 1995 tour of the U.S. is planned to promote the album, and the new single.

"The Honeymoon Is Over" is the band's third album. Before it were "This Is Not The Way Home", which has now gone gold; and their debut "Down Below" (all released on Redeye Records, through Polydor).

The band has been recording new material over the past few months, in between the overseas touring, with the successful single "Better Get A Lawyer", launching the band's latest Australian tour.

Andy White Liam O'Maonlai Tim Finn (Ireland) (Ireland) (New Zealand)

A superb combination of three internationally acclaimed singer/songwriters come together to form ALT. Tim Finn - the highly successful solo artist and former front man of Split Enz - needs no introduction to Australian audiences, Liam O' Maonlai

is the lead singer of the Hot House Flowers and Andy White is regarded as one of Ireland's finest songwriters. The three first came together to write "Many's The Time" on Tim's Before And After album and liked the combo so much they decided to do it again. Their first single is "We're All Men" from the ALT album - listen out for it, then come and see them live.

Rockin' Rembets

The Rockin' Rembets perform impassioned Greek rebetiko music, often referred to as the Greek Blues! Their music expresses the experiences of people living on urban margins of mainstream society and draws on music from Greece, Turkey and the Middle East. Using traditional instruments including the bouzouki violin, baglama, guitar toumberleki, the Rockin' Rembets draw from a rich tradition of songs, lively dance rhythms and inspired improvisations.

The Rockin' Rembets appear with the support of Foundation SA.

Justin Vali Tria

Justin VALI sees himself as an ambassador for today's Malagasy music, his dynamic personal touch has combined all aspects of the Island's music. Tastefully mixing African rhythmical influences with refined Asian melodies and harmonies enhanced by elaborate Oriental structures and orchestrations and all,



Madagascar is the living mirror of all musical blends. Each region has it's instrument and sound but the common link between them is a string instrument called VAHILA. The Vahila (pronounced Vali) is found all over the island, in different materials, shapes, sounds and functions. As a child, Justin

travelled throughout the island learning and adapting an unlimited repertoire of classical, ceremonial, traditional and modern tunes. Soon he was the only musician to master all Vahilas. His unequalled virtuosity is expressed though his own vibrating voice, his rich compositions and refined orchestrations and arrangements.

On stage, eyes closed, he is in total concentration. With all his soul he can squeeze out a thousand amazing sounds from a piece of bamboo. With his fellow musicians on the guitar and kabossy ("Malagasy mandoline") they create an irresistible atmosphere groove.

The Justin VALI trio is designed to reveal the diverse aspects of the Malagasy music as well as his own compositions.

Justin VALI has so far released in France two albums, on Silex records: "RAMBALA" in 91, under his own name and "BILO", as a part of all-star Malagasy group, MALAGACHE CONNEXION in 92. "RAMBALA 2" is his current record. He also participated in the recording of Kate Bush's latest recording.

Mutton Birds



Their music has been described as "Twin Peaks meets The Beatles" while lead singer and songwriter Don McGlashan has been dubbed the heir apparent to Neil Finn's songwriting throne. A member of the locally

influential post punk band Blam Blam Blam in the early 80's, McGlashan has established himself as one of New Zealand's most acclaimed songwriters (he scored Jane Campion's "An Angel At My Table"). The Mutton Birds' fourth single Anchor Me from their highly successful Salty album is currently the most played local song on New Zealand radio, while the album is achieving big-time status in Canada and Germany following the band's recent tour. Insightful ballads, songs about shopping centres and life - New Zealand's best export since Kiwi

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
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

Adel Salameh & Krishnamurti Sridhar

Adel Salameh was born in Nablus in the West Bank in 1966. He plays the 'oud, or Arab lute, an instrument dating back thousands of years. Adel obtained a degree in music from Yarmouk University, Jordan, in 1990, and continued his studies in classical and traditional Arab music with Professor Mu'taz Mohammed Bayah at his school in Baghdad. These studies required a high level of technique and demanded a great deal of inspiration and spiritual feeling. Adel began his musical career performing in international festivals in Jordan and in Egypt. In 1990, he gave solo concerts at the French, British and Soviet cultural centres in Amman, Jordan. He also performed at the anniversary of the Royal Society of Fine Arts in the presence of Her Majesty Queen Noor of Jordan. Between 1990 and July 1992 he lived in Italy, where he performed in private concerts and took part in music programmes for the Italian radio and television network. He took part in the Bellotn International Festival, France, in June 1992, and performed in the Womad 10th anniversary festival in Reading in July 1992.

Since that time he has lived in England and has appeared in concerts at St Georges and the Rare Music Club, Bristol. He also made a recording for the BBC Arabic Service and played live on the Kaleidoscope arts programme for BBC Radio 4. Adel plays traditional and classical Arab music. His ambittion is to encourage a greater understanding in the West both of the 'oud and of Arab music in general.

Krishnamurti Sridhar

Two music traditions co-exist in India, that of the North (Hindustani) and of the South (Carnatic). They share the same basic systems but differ greatly by the instruments used, by the Ragas played and by the concept of musical expression. It is very rare for musicians to master both traditions; Sridhar has done so.

The Sarod is an instrument of great complexity and few musicians choose to play it. Of the 25 strings 4 are used for melody, 2 for mythm, 4 tuned to the dominant notes of the raga and the remaining 15 are sympathetic, vibrating strings tuned to the micro notes of the raga. The range and sonority of the Sarod makes it one of the most beautiful of North Indian instruments, its complexity allowing for an extraordinary diversity of sound and mood.

At the age of 14, while still studying, Sridhar became the youngest member of Ravi Shankar's orchestral group. At 25 he was granted the honorary title 'Sur Mani' (Sky Jewel) at the famous festival of Kal-ke-Kalalar in Bombay. Sridhar started touring out of India in 1982. He has given hundreds of concerts throughout Europe, the near and far East. He has conducted seminars in Indian music and has forged exciting links with musicians of various disciplines, jazz, flamenco, Arabic, African, Iranian and European classical.

There is nothing more irresistible than the sound of panpipes. This band of traditional singers and instrumentalists create the magical music of the Andes. From the wistful sounds of the panpipes to the high pitched resonance of the ten-stringed charango, this spiritually rich and earthy music speaks of the lives, joys and pain of the indigenous people of South America, Now based in Adelaide, this troupe of artists comes together from New Zealand, Mexico, Iran and Chile to create a joyous celebration of one of the world's great music traditions.




Playing Australia gives all Australians, wherever they live, better access to some of the country's best performing arts.

Until now it has been difficult for all Australians to be directly exposed to a truly diverse range of our nation's best performing arts companies. Playing Australia has been developed to break down the tyranny of distance which often prevents highly acclaimed companies from touring a long way from home.

This new touring scheme, funded by the Federal Government, is designed specifically to help performing arts companies tour to areas outside their home state where this may not have been commercially practicable otherwise. That not only means taking high quality performances into some of the more inaccessible parts of the country, but also giving regional performers the chance to play to new, diverse and bigger audiences.

Playing Australia aims to assist major national performing arts organisations to expand their touring programs, help vanues and locally based organisers host touring activities and to encourage innovative and high quality performers to take their work across Australia.

Gesuino Deiana

Sardinian music is so close to our own doorstep that unfortunately musicologists have tended to completely overlook it in their search for challenging new music. However top Sardinian guitarist Gesuino Deiana is determined to make amends by promoting the quality and diversity of music from this jewel of the Mediterranean. Prior to recording his first solo album, Deiana, who favours an open-tuned style of playing his acoustic guitar, numbers among his appreciators other guitar luminaries including Al di Meola, Paco de Lucia, Albeno Balia, and Enrico Froncia.

Back in Olbia he fronts Sardinia's top group 'Cordas et Cannas' besides organising a thriving winter festival which last year brought together UK-based musicians: Gary Husband, Ravi's Kora Colours and Dr. Didg, Adel Salameh, and Peter Lockett to play with a wide range of Italian musicians. Gesuino is also co-ordinating the first ever WOMAD festival on Sardinia which takes place later this year in September. Gesuino is also involved in an acoustic group 'Abbanegra' which includes Alberto Balia (guit), Massimo Nardi (guit), and Carlo Mariani (launeddas).

Sardinia's geographical location means that many different cultures brought about through contact with passing traders have influenced her music, consequently it's not unusual to hear traces of Spanish, Celtic, Arab, and African music. Added to this is the polyphonic singing of the shepherds - otherwise known as 'Tenores'. Virtually every community on Sardinia has it's own Tenores and their tradition of singing stems back many centuries to when it was a form of telling the news. Cordas et Cannas have successfully mixed traditional Sardinian music with a contemporary sound and also involved an instrument peculiar to Sardinia called the Launeddas.

Yungchen Lhama



Yungchen Lhamo's sublime voice has filled the Tibetan mountains and valleys. Born and raised in the Tibetan capital Lhasa, she left her home in 1989, crossing the Himalayas and taking refuge in Dharamsala (the home of the Dalai Lama) until 1993 when she moved to Australia. Yungchen sings

Tibetan Buddhist folk stories and myths from the Lhamo tradition with a voice which is as awe-inspiring as the mountains of her country. Reminiscent of the solo genius of Sheila Chandra,

Yungchen's performances will provide one of those special moments of WOMADELAIDE.

Stella Chiweshe

Mesmerising is the word most often used to describe Stella Chiweshe's performance. She plays the mbira, a traditional thumb piano with an evocative, mysterious tone. On stage the instrument's delicate sounds contrast effectively with her swooping vocals and the dexterous rhythms of percussion player

Gilson. In Zimbabwe the playing of the mbira is a male tradition, but, since convincing her uncle to instruct her in the music of her ancestors, Stella has become the acknowledged queen of the instrument. Her presence is magic, her music will touch your soul.


She certainly uses the mystiques of the instrument in her shows to good effect, sometimes going into a trance on the stage. With her penetrating eyes, habitual snuff-taking, ankle charms, and dreadlocks, she can be a frightening presence when she chooses.

"When I'm playing I can really feel the spirit of a person plucking the keys," says Chiweshe in World Music: The Rough Guide. "And then I know that this one is for this spirit and this one is for that spirit. It feels like the spirits are waking up."

Bad Boys Batucada

Their sound is big, BAD 'n beautiful. With influences from Africa and Brazil to Australia, the Bad Boys are a street-wise Brazilian percussion and dance troupe who fire up the samba beat and perform a rhythmic martial-art dance; the capoeira. Using traditional instruments, with a touch of turntable, Bad Boys Batucada rage on stage creating endless dance rhythms, complex tribal and urban pulse heats, and a continuous celebration of movement. These six musicians - now based in Melbourne - hail from Brazil, France, Singapore and Australia making an eclectic collective of great sounds.



Hubwe Zawose

Born in Dodoma, Tanzania in 1940, Hukwe Zawose spent his childhood raising cattle and is now one of Tanzania's foremost traditional musicians. He performs the music of his people - the Wagogo - a mix of traditional story-based pieces, political celebration songs as well as his own compositions. Apart from an unforgettable voice, Zawose performs an extraordinary array of traditional instruments including the ilimba (thumb piano), zeze (stringed instrument), and harmonic flutes. His work is a joyful celebration of his heritage, and dressed in elaborate traditional costumes his performances are an exotic and delightful spectacle.



The band's name comes from the Aboriginal Dreamtime legend which sees the two women creators emerging from where the SunRizes, where they made the rivers, the creeks, the people's traditional names, ancestral beings and Aboriginal totems. 
Archie Roach was taken from his parents at the age of three and told that his family had perished in a fire. It was only as a teenager that he discovered that his mother had just died, and the shock was devastating.



Bangarra Dance Theatre Australia respectfully embraces the cultures of both indigenous peoples of Australia - the mainland Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures. Deriving its cultural identity from the Yirritja clan of Yirrkala in North East Amhem land and Murray Islanders of the Torres Strait Islands. The company was founded in 1989 and appointed its first full-time Artistic Director Mr Stephen Page in 1991. Under the artistic direction of Mr Page, Bangarra has spearheaded the development of a new style of contemporary Australian dance, by drawing boldly on the essence and spirituality of Australian indigenous culture. They see themselves as the essence of Australia's indigenous contemporary culture determined to highlight the diversity and richness of our heritage. Bangarra also sees itself as in the forefront of cultural reconciliation between urban indigenous Australians and their traditional counterparts as well as between indigenous and non-indigenous culture in the wider community.



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
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
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Kate Ceberano





Lawrence Martin was born on the Moose Factory Reserve; his mother was Cree and his father was irish, raised by his grandparents and taught guitar by an aunt he was educated in North Bay, took a variety of jobs before going back to school to train for a dream - to become part of the communications industry. He is now executive director of the Wawatay Native Communications Society, which provides radio, television and newspaper communications to almost 50 reserves throughout northern Ontario. He is also the mayor of Sioux Lookout, a community of more than 3,000 - and the first native to be elected mayor in Ontario history.

He was also the first recipient of the Juno award for Aboriginal Music.

Martin has also become a songwriter and performer whose music instantly communicates the joy, heritage, wisdom and new optimism of his people as well as the anger and bitterness that stems from five centuries of abuse, neglect and ignorance.

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
Utungan Percussion



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ASHOK ROY

Indian sarod player ASHOK ROY has been visiting and living in Australia since the mid-70's, playing, teaching, and enriching the local musical community. Director of the Australian Institute of Eastern Music In Sydney, a frequent university lecturer, coleader of the multi-cultural group, Sangam, and an inspiring solo performer, Roy has recently released a beautiful traditional album, MASTER OF THE SAROD, through Larrikin and will be appearing at Womadelaide with Silvanje. He spoke with SETH JORDAN for RHYTHMS.

Seth Jordan: You began studying at the early age of 5 with your father. He was a musician in India himself? A s h o k:
That's right.
He also specials

ized in sarod, but he could play a number of other instruments as well. I come from a very musical family. My brother is also a sarod player, and my uncle is a very good sitar player, so the whole family has got this interest.

SJ: You began with several years of vocal training and then you were also instructed in tabla. Why were you drawn to sarod rather than becoming a tabla player or vocalist?

AR: In India we didn't have textbooks, notation, no written music. When you go to a teacher to learn an instrument, if you have a background in singing, you can learn very quickly. The teacher either sings or plays and you have to catch up. Our music is based mainly on improvisation with, of course, strict rules and regulations. On the rhythm side, if you know a little bit of tabla then you are also aware of the rhythmic circle. This is the traditional style of learning, and with this background you play your instrument.

SJ: You were talented enough to become a student of the great sarod virtuoso Ustad Ali Akbar Khan. How did that come about?

AR: I started with him when I was 15 or 16. My father was a student of his father, so that too was in the family. I was fascinated by his playing, and I thought if I play music, I have to play sarod like this, and if I have to learn from someone, it is the great master.

SJ: Many Westerners might be more familiar with the sitar, but probably less so with the sarod?

AR: There are different opinions on its history, but basically I feel it has come from Afghanistan, not in the shape of the sarod but as the Afghani rabab. You can also find it in Persia, Iran. The northern part of India was invaded by the Muslims, and if you go back further, by Alexander, and

Afghanistan to create the modern sarod. It has 25 strings,
although 15 are sympathetic
strings which vibrate when we
strike the main string. Sarod is a
one-piece oud covered with a
skin, and it is fretless, with a silver fingerboard, and it is played
with a plectrum.

SJ: How did you come to settle in Australia?

AR: In 1972 I was posted by the Indian government to Fiji because at that time they had opened an Indian Cultural Centre there. I was there for four years. I came to Australia for the first time in '75 because we were touring quite often in the South Pacific region. My performances here were mostly confined to the universities. I was giving lectures and workshops at Sydney University and at Monash in Melbourne, I visited again in '78, and had a fairly extensive concert tour, going to smaller places as well as the cities. I became Artist in Residence at Monash in'80.



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

Mick Taylor

Perhaps best known for his stint with the 'world's greatest rock n' roll' band' Mick Taylor has been out of mainstream sight for a number of years but has been recording, doing

session work and touring. His gigs here several years ago were evidence of his sensational abilities with the music ranging from straight ahead rock n' roll (a la The Stones) to wonderful laid back blues riffs. Taylor's blues feeling, first honed in John Mayall's Bluesbreakers, is still as keen as ever. In recent times Taylor has been working with California-based Texan guitarist Carla Olson. As well as recording studio and live albums together. Taylor recently sat in on Olson's latest recording, "Reap The Whirlwind" (Watermelon/Shock). You can also find Mick Taylor's distinctive touch on the new album by soul singer Percy Sledge.

As interest in the guitarist remains as strong as ever amongst rock and blues fans, Taylor's 1979 solo album has been re-released on CD. You can get a preview of his live performances by checking out "Stranger in This Town" a tremendous 1990 live album released in 1990 by Maze Records.

MARGIE EVANS can be heard guesting on the MIGHTY REAPERS 1994 release "Trouble No More", which won the Rhythms Readers Poll for best Australian blues album of the year. Her rich voice is one of the highlights of a great recording. The Reapers will be back, along with The Backsliders and right there you two of the very best local blues

MICHAEL HILL'S BLUES MOB are one of the younger American blues bands to emerge over the past few years. First heard as part of the Black Rock Coalition compilation, Hill writes powerful blues songs about contemporary issues. THE MIGHTY CHARIOTS from New Orleans should inspire the crowds on Sunday's gospel showcase with their harmonies.

The Australian contingent this year is possibly the strongest local line-up ever. Renee Geyer, hot on the heels of her latest album "Difficult Woman", should

prove once more that she is this country's best soul: singer. Vika and Linda will no doubt add to the gospel touch but, as their "Vika & Linda" album proves, they sing some mighty fine rock songs as well. Chris Wilson is back on the scene with a vengeance and is riding high with the popularity of "Live At The Continental". The album was runner-up in the Rhythms Readers Poll for Australian album of the year and exemplifies Wilson's powerful voice. Expect to hear some blues classics as you have never heard them before. The feast of homegrown blues will also see such acts as The Phil Manning band, The Hippos, Shane Pacey & The Cigars, Whose Muddy Shoes, Geoff Achison & Kelly Auty, The Mojos and many more. As a result of the military coupe in 1973, Isabel, with many other of her fellow artists and thousands of Chileans were exiled and forced to seek political asylum. She lived in Paris for eleven years and conpolitical sayuni. She lived in Paris for eleven years and continued to work as a messenger of Chilean culture and politics, performing throughout Europe, the United States and Argentina. She returned to her homeland in 1988 where she was awarded the prestigious 'Golden Laurel' for her continuing work in promoting Chilean culture and folklore.

Andy Baylor is one of 200 musiclans that will be taking part this year's Apollo Bay Music Festival. Few of these performers will have Andy's range or depth of musical experience.

Andy's current outfit is his Cajun Combo. This group has backed legendary blues performers Screaming Jay Hawkins, Louisiana Red and Jimmy Witherspoon and has supported Flaco Jiminez, Silm Dusty and Bob Dylan. The band have a new CD out through Shock.

The voice of singer Kelly Auty will be one of those heard at this year's Apollo Bay Music Festival. Like many of the greats in



FESTIVAL REPORT

The Port Fairy Folk Festival won the 1994 Australian National Tourism Award (Festivals and special events) for the second year in a row. It is the first major acoustic music festival to have won this award. Drawing on artists from around the world and collecting the best of local musicians the festival, now in its nineteenth year, draws a huge crowd each year to the beautiful seaside village of Port Fairy.





Tinsley Ellis grew up close to the source. In Atlanta, Georgia to be exact. Early encounters with legends such as B.B. King and Howlin' Wolf gave the young southerner a taste for the blues which has remained with him all his life. "I kind of got hooked on the blues when I was a teenager." he says "I went to see a lot of the greats and I just always wanted to play that kind of music. When I was 22 years old I joined a blues band here in Atlanta called The Alley cats

and I've been sticking with the blues ever since." Perhaps the thing that determined Ellis' destiny was when he was sitting in the

front row at a B.B.King gig as a fourteen year old and King broke a string on his famous Lucille and handed it to him. Ellis kept that string. "I saw B.B. for the first time in a nightclub," he explains." And it was before he had his big hit 'The Thrill Is Gone'. He was playing a special teenage show for kids

only in the afternoon. It was a no-alcohol thing and I was about 14 or 15. I sat there and really was in wonder. I just thought he was so great and after the show he talked to everyone in the lobby. He was a very nice man. This was in 1971 or '72. What I learned from B.B.King was just the general attitude that less is more and the way he would sing a phrase and then answer it on guitar. I always thought it was really cool for him to be able to do that."

Ellis has been riding high on the wave of blues popularity since the mid-80s. At one stage critics named him alongside Johnny Winter and Stevie Ray

Vaughan as one of the three top white blues guitarist in the country. He feels there is no such thing as an exclusively blues audience any more and aims his music towards a wide market.

"I think the music has become so popular here in the United States," he says."That if you were to go to a real blues show it would probably be in front of a very small audience and it would be out in the woods.

somewhere in Mississippi maybe." So who would qualify as a real blues artist these days ? R.L.Burnside ? The very Jimi Hendrix-like Booba Barnes?

"He's amazing," says Ellis enthusiastically of Barnes."He's got all kinds of gold chains and a ring on each finger. He's a wildlooking character. I've got a picture of him and me and it

definitely looks like a before and after picture. I lok like before and he looks like after. His body looks like he's about twenty and his face looks like he's about one hundred. There's a lot of mileage on his brow. If Keith Richards was to retire maybe (the Rolling Stones) would get

Boob Barnes to replace him." The funk-like rhythms of electrified delta boogie are also present in Tinsley Ellis' music. He lists fellow Georgians James Brown and Otis Redding as strong influences.

What started off as blues really turned into, through the James Brown years, something very much more funky. If you go to a real Southside blues bar in Chicago you'll hear a lot of real James Brown rhythms. I really like the music that came from here in the state of Georgia like James Brown and Otis Redding and that's kind of the influence [on me] from that way. The voice of the blues, whether it's guitar or

vocal or harmonica, has kind of staved the same over the years with the same inflections. Where the music has changed has been in the different beats. the different rhythms and also the different chord progressions. We definitely mix a lot of the new in with the old ... or try to."

Ellis is looking forward to his first Australian sojourn. "We've just completed a coast to coast U.S. and Canada tour which took us to 45 states." he says."We really knocked off a large part of America and we're very excited about going to Australia for the very first time."

Tinsley Ellis' new album "Storm Warning" is released through Festival Records.

Well, 1995 certainly got off to a flying start in January, with visits from John Scofield, McCoy Tyner, Stan Tracey, Billy Cobham and several others. The last three won't actually be here until after my deadline; but I Ellington's 'jungle period' (late '20scan say that John Scofield's shows at The early '30s), rock, 'free jazz', Balinese Basement were a knockout

I made the trip to Sydney (as did quite a few musos and fans from Melbourne), to catch five sets over three nights. While there was some overlap in repertoire, each set was different, as promised, the players really working hard and stretching out. Scofield's guitar playing was simply brilliant, highly inventive. And what a superb, hand-in-glove unit this was, with keyboardist Larry Goldings, bassist Dennis Irwin and drummer Bill Stewart all playing the team game. Here's hoping they make it to Melbourne next time

There's plenty of good news to look forward to this month, with tours from US drummer Cindy Blackman, and the New Jungle Orchestra from Denmark.

According to those who caught rock star Lenny Kravitz's concerts last year, Cindy Blackman stole the show with her powerhouse drumming. I wasn't there, but I can say that her Muse records (with names like Joe Henderson, Kenny Barron, Steve Coleman and Wallace Roney) leave no doubt that she is an exciting jazz player, and one with the potential to establish herself as a star on the New York scene.

She will play jazz standards and original material with what is sure to be a compatible group of energetic Australian musicians, all more or less in Blackman's age group (mid 20s - mid 30s). Melbourne trumpeter Scott Tinkler (who loves being described as an 'unabashedly aggressive' player) will be the front man for most gigs, Sydney bassist Jonathan Zwartz will anchor the band, while the piano chair will be filled by Paul Grabowsky in Melbourne, or Barney McAll (who recently moved to the harbor city) in Sydney and Brisbane.

Cindy Blackman will be at The Basement on February 15, 16 and 21. In Melbourne, you can catch her at Bennetts Lane on the 10th and 18th, and the Royal Derby on the 19th. She will also play at the Brisbane Travelodge on the 11th (with Sydney tenor man Dale Barlow), and at the Perth Jazz society on the

13th (with a local band, hopefully including the impressive young tenor player Jamie Oehlers). There is also a chance of dates in Canberra and Adelaide

Led by guitarist Pierre Dorge, the New Jungle Orchestra is an eclectic and bold ensemble, whose music incorpo-Gamelan and West African percussion.

They are the official Danish State Ensemble for 1993-96, so this tour has been funded by the Danish government as a cultural goodwill mission (this year will also see the band tour the USA, Canada and Ghana).

The other members of the ensemble, drawn from Denmark. Germany and Ghana, are Irene Becker (keyboards), Jesper Zeuthen (alto sax, bass clarinet), Morten Carlsen (tenor sax, clarinet, taragot), Volker Schlott (tenor, soprano sax) ,Kenneth Agerholm (trombone), Hugo Rasmussen (bass), Bent Clausen (drums) and Ayi Solomon (percus-

They will play at the Kiama Jazz Festival on 11 February; at Kuranda Rainforest Resort in Queensland on the 14th; at Her Majesty's in Ballarat on the 17th; at Peter Gaudion's Jazz Lane on the 18th and 19th; for the Perth Jazz Society on the 20th; at The Office in Adelaide on the 22nd; and at Van Gogh's Earlobe in Brisbane on the 23rd.

Harry Connick Jr will be here in February, too, playing more of a pop style (though with a Nawlins funk influence); trumpeter Leroy Jones will be leading the backing band - he was a standout player when Connick brought his big band out here in '93.

Popular New York cabaret singer, pianist and songwriter Blossom Dearie will be doing an extensive tour in February and March, playing smaller, intimate venues this time around, rather than concert halls as on previous visits. She will be joined by Sydney bassist Phil Scorgie, with whom she recorded 'Me And Phil', a concert album for ABC Records, in 1993. As well as The Basement in Sydney and The Continental in Melbourne, they will be at Tilley's in Canberra (25-26/2); the Tivoli in Brisbane (34/3); the Hyde Park Hotel in Perth (12-13/3); and the Adelaide Space Cabaret

March will also see a tour from a German trio, comprising Gerd Dudek (saxes, flute), Ali Haurand (bass) and Rob Van Den Broeck (piano). Full details next month. Al Jarreau, a stylish pop singer who incor-

porates some jazz elements in his music, will be doing the Hilton circuit in April. Looking ahead, I believe that Ornette Coleman and Lee Konitz are both strong chances to be here around the middle of the year, as is my favorite jazz singer. Betty Carter.

AROUND MELBOURNE

Bennett's Lane makes a welcome return after a month-long break. The February roster will include the ever-impressive Scott Tinkler Quartet on Wednesdays, and bassist Ben Robertson's Songhouse on Thursdays, UK drummer Clark Tracey (on tour with his dad, Stan Tracey) will present some of his own music on the 3rd and 4th.

The Melbourne Jazz Co-op's Sunday series resumes with a trio comprising drummer Allan Browne, bassist Nick Haywood and pianist Tim Stevens on the 5th; tenor saxophonist Anton Delecca (backed by Sam Keevers, Philip Rex and Scott Lambie) on the 12th; guitarist Lucas Michailidis' Hippno Clique on the 19th; and what might well be a swansong gig for the Barney McAll Quartet (with David Rex, Philip Rex and Allan Browne) on the 26th.

Looking ahead to March, there is a tentative booking for the mighty Freeboppers (led by Sydney tenor saxophonist Mark Simmonds. and featuring bassist Steve Elphick and drummer Simon Barker, with Scott Tinkler completing the quartet) on the 5th; and the Allan Browne Quartet (featuring David Rex on alto, Scott Griffiths on piano and Howard Cairns on bass) will launch their Newmarket CD on the 12th

The lineup at Peter Gaudion's Jazz Lane this month includes specials with Edwin Duff, a veteran singer on the local jazz scene, on the 12th; and a band from France, led by Laurent De Wilde on the 27th

Popular singer Christine Sullivan will be resident on Wednesdays. And Thursdays will be set aside for the 'Out To Lunch' sessions, with some of Melbourne's finest modern players. Pianist Hark Fitzgibbon will work

COLTRANE IN SEATTLE

Those readers with some stamina and a long memory might recall the two-part survey I wrote on the recordings of John Coltrane a year or more back. Of the 2-LP Impulse set, 'Live In Seattle', I said that it 'often degenerated into a screaming competition —for once, Elvin struggled to match the saxophonists for energy — but still had some gripping passages, mainly from Trane."

The band at the time included the classic Coltrane rhythm section (McCoy Tyner, Jimmy Garrison, Elvin Jones), plus Pharoah Sanders (tenor saxophone) and Donald Garrett (bass clarinet, bass).

Well, GRP have now issued it as a 2-CD set (GRP 21462), expanded to include a 21-minute version of the standard 'Body And Soul', and 34 minutes of Mongo Santamaria's 'Afro Blue' (made famous by Coltrane's version on the '63 LP 'Live At Birdland'), the latter halting when the music is in full flight, apparently due to the engineer running out of tape.

The additional material doesn't alter my view that this performance included some messy scrambling, as well as some powerful highs; but fans who are prepared to go this far with Coltrane, will no doubt want the full picture (or as much as was captured on tape).

HEADING OVERSEAS?

The New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival seems to be increasingly popular for tourists from Australia. In addition to the package being put together by Rhythms (see elsewhere for details), I know of groups being led by ABC Classic FM's Jim McLeod, and local jazz broadcaster with 3WRB FM, Margaret Peterson.

Jim McLeod has led a tour to New Orleans for several years now. His schedule includes four nights in San Francisco and 12 nights in New Orleans, departing on 22 April. Cost is from \$4490; call Peregrine Travel on (08) 223 5005

Occasionally a mutant act breaks through - The Happening Thang with brilliant management and a great song (" I Don't Wanna Go To Work") did it, only to be attacked by various hardliners as sham, while The Fargone Beauties continue to confound everybody that being their only charm! (Note both these acts originated out of Sydney).

Tess McKenna is from country Victoria, her first appearance at Tamworth saw her whole weeks work cancelled (that was before she signed to ABC) now I would guess she'd be tolerated as an oddball! Melburnian New Zealander Brent Parlane was greeted with suspicion and I think he still thinks "they" are waiting for him to become some manic rocker instead of the fine singer/songwriter he is, even though he has a "golden guitar" on his mantelpiece. His occasional mate Greg Champion has 'played the game" leaving a fair bit of his warped self under wraps as "not suitable for Tamworth exhibition".

Ted Hawkins 1936 - 1995

Two days into 1995 an urgent message came through from Nancy Meyer, Ted's manager, to inform me he had died on go on doing what they do, some offering New Years Day while in a coma caused

> As the co-promoter of his tour last year and already planning a return in April due to it's success, I had to call many people and inform them during the following days - in all cases there was a shock and sadness expressed way beyond professional association.

> Australia had really taken to this "old voice delivered with a total lack of pretence, sitting on a milk crate and strumming rudimentary blocks on his guitar. A modern day tunesmith in the Leadbelly tradition he was an original and the world without him is a poorer place.

> His songs too, had a strange spiritual quality and were at once contemporary and of another place and time.

On arrival in Australia he had told myself and the Geffen records representative of his "dream" of having a chart album. A mere three weeks later he had achieved that in this country so I know Australia holds a special place in his heart as he does in the people who saw any of the six shows he performed live here.

One of Ted's quotes was "I've been dead many times but too stubborn to lie down" well death finally caught him after a hard life but not before Hawkins had changed his life mainly by his own dogged determination and the latter day help of a few key people. Along the way he genuinely affected those he came in contact with by his sheer presence and we can only dream about what might have been.

He is still "the unstoppable" Ted Hawkins.

PSARANDONI

Antonis Xylouris, "Psarandoni" started to play traditional Cretan music at the age of ten. Twenty years later, in the mid 1970's, when he began to adapt this traditional music to a startling personal style, a lot of his compatriots

this traditional music to a startling personal style, a lot of his compatriots thought he'd gone musically mad. Cretan music is strong on improvisation, but Psarandoni was going beyond that. He was composing new melody, breaking the even flow of the dance music, dramatising the dynamics of the form, firing up the emotional intensity of the music way beyond its already high levels.

levels. Today Psarandoni has a huge following for his inimitable music. Young traditional musicians learn from his example and old ones provide him with material they have retrieved. People with little interest in Greek music find his performances compelling. He draws thousands to concerts in major Greek cities, and thousands outside Greece, especially in Germany, where he gave his first concert in 1982, and in Canada, the United States, Italy, France and Britain.

Psarandoni is the second son of a revered musical family, whose male members are mysteriously entitled to add "psaro", meaning 'fish', to their names (perhaps after an ancestor reputed to impale enemies like fish). His older brother Psaronikis played a major role in the post-war revival of traditional Greek music. In Australia Psarandoni will perform with his con Psaropistrios.

form with his son Psarogiorgios.
The tradition within which Psarondoni works and experiments is one of the strongest interlocking music traditions of the Eastern Mediterranean and Middle East. A song tradition as well as the dance music that makes Cretan wedlings and celebrations so recognisable have both thrived for centuries elements of the song tradition originate in Byzantine music.

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
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
