The WOMADelaide Foundation presents RANGO (EGYPT/SUDAN) CHILDREN'S PERCUSSION & DANCE WORKSHOP



WOMADelaide is offering primary school children the chance to join members of the visiting music and dance group, Rango, in an exciting, one-off percussion and dance workshop on Thursday 10 March 2011 at the Gilles Street Primary School in Adelaide city. Limited capacity!

Rango are a stunning group of Sudanese master-musicians and dancers who take their name from the 'rango' instrument, an ancient xylophone that was originally used to make music in Sudan and migrated to Egypt during the 1820s.

Their high-energy, percussion-driven music is traditionally performed at healing ceremonies and weddings and it combines elements of trance, ritual and delirious celebration.

In the workshop, Rango will perform semi-acoustic renditions of their favourite Sudanese dancing songs. They will teach children the mysterious *Mangor* dance, give a brief history of Sudan and Egypt and the origins of the rango instrument and show the children how to play their very own rango shaker.

Originally made from gourds (dried fruits/vegetables), the rango shaker made its way to Egypt as the slave communities sought solace from the harsh realities of their everyday lives through the music of the Zar ritual and its healing powers. The Sudanese people believed the ancient songs and dances would cleanse the soul and relieve suffering.

These days, the shakers are made from insect repellent cans filled with Egyptian beans and decorated with beautiful beads, colourful stickers and stunning prints of ancient carvings that tell the stories or Sudanese folklore.

Teachers will be supplied with information in advance so that the participating students can make their very own low-cost "RANGO SHAKIER SHEIKH SHAKER '(RSSS!)" – out of Pringles canisters, rice, foil, ribbon etc - to bring to the workshop.



This is a rare opportunity for children to take part in a hands-on activity and to learn some of the secrets and intriguing traditions of ancient Sudanese culture as well as how to recreate the hypnotic rhythms found in Rango's music.
